Message from Tony



Dear Friends,

I wonder how good you are at solving murder mysteries. I heard recently about an experiment where groups of people were given a whodunit and asked to

work it out. They were provided with case notes, records of interviews and descriptions of suspects. These contained the clues that would lead to the answer. Each group had to decide which one of three people had committed the crime. The groups trying to solve the problem were made up of four people. Some groups were made up of four friends, and some of three friends and one stranger.

The groups made up entirely of friends enjoyed the process, had a happy time and were confident that they had done well. Those that included one stranger did not enjoy the process, their time together was not happy and they doubted that they had done well.

I wish I could tell you that the result of this experiment was that the groups of four friends did best. It would suit me if this was a story about how good relationships and feeling comfortable together equals better achievement. But the opposite turned out to be true. Those groups that contained a stranger were considerably better at getting the right answer than those who were just made up of friends.

It appears that we sometimes do better and achieve more in difficult circumstances than we do when things are easy. The presence of a stranger in the groups trying to solve the mystery left people feeling awkward. They found themselves having to work a bit harder. In contrast the groups of friends may have been a little complacent and may have got a bit too comfortable. It seems that having obstacles to overcome, having a bit of a mess to contend with can sometimes be helpful. We might not enjoy it, but the end result is greater creativity and more success in getting the job done.

I wonder if any of that sounds familiar to us at St Luke's. We have faced challenging times recently as we have put together and are about to start work on plans for our building. It is hard to put together proposals; get others to agree with what we are doing; raise the money through fund raising and completing grant applications; deal with architects and builders. But while we have faced the challenge the spirit within the Church has been good. When Sam Funnell came to take our Church Anniversary last year she commented on how we seemed to be in good heart and how it was a joy to be with us. Maybe taking an uphill struggle sometimes does us good. Perhaps it gives us a sense of purpose and causes us to pull together.

May God continue to bless us, Tony

PS: I got the story of the groups of people solving a murder mystery from Tim Harford. Some of you may know him as the presenter of the radio programme "More or Less". He used the whodunit illustration in a fantastic talk with the title "How messy problems can inspire creativity" which you can find on the internet. Report of the Church Property and Finance committee to St Luke's Church Council on Thursday 18th February 2016

Where does one start? In December we met with the Architect and advised him that we were still waiting for consent from the Methodist Church to carry out our building scheme. It was agreed that we still went out to Tender for the contract but we could at that stage NOT commit the church to any contractor.

The consent came through in early January 2016 before the closing date for the tenders which were being sent to the architect direct.

When the tenders were received and opened a meeting was held between the property committee and the architect. We looked in great depth at all the tenders and were guided through this process by James Wood the architect. Several of those who were invited to tender did not do so. Of those who did tender three of them had requested site visits before placing their tender.

One of the tenderers did not give a detailed enough tender and were very wishy washy on other aspects. Of the two tenders we looked at the committee felt that the figure they had submitted were much higher that we were expecting. We asked the architect to ask these two tenderers to see if there was any way they could cut cost and resubmit.

James was also given the names of two other building companies to approach.

.. 11 New tenders were sorted and following a meeting on Saturday 13th February it was agreed, after a great deal of discussion, subject to Church Council approval we give the job to Astral builders, architects fees a cost of £139,663,50 Plus VAT, plus the architect's fees making the who project about £190,000 incl VAT. We currently have about £120,000 raised and promised and we now have to go out to ask for grants, this would be done by Ian Smith and Val Gibson. We have at least 11 places to contact for a grant.

There were to be a number of Pre Contract meetings and ongoing meetings during the building process and these would be attended by Ian and Danny. If either one could not attend another member of the property meeting would stand in.

Again I would like to place on record the thanks of the Property and Finance committee for the help, support and encouragement of Mr Brian Davis and Mr Roger Barton from the circuit.

I would like to propose on behalf of the Property and finance committee the following:

- That the actions of the property and finance meeting regarding the contact for the work to be given to Astral builders
- 2. That any meetings held between the architect, and builder be attended by Ian Smith and Danny Gibson or a substitute if one of these two are not available
- That the Church Council agree to grants being sort on behalf of the Church by Ian & Val

Offertory Envelopes and

The offertory envelope system is one simple way of financially supporting St Luke's by encouraging regular weekly giving . The system is simple, a set of fifty-two weekly dated and numbered envelopes are issued. The number identifies the person to whom the envelope has been issued and the dates are for each Sunday, so that if you are unable to attend St Luke's for any reason the offering can be put in the envelope each week and given at the next visit to church. The advantage of church members using this system helps the Treasurer when preparing the budgets and Angie Rastall who administers the Gift Aid Scheme. As the Envelope Secretary my role is to administer, order and supply the envelopes and I am not present when the envelopes are opened or aware of the contents. In 1982, 71 members of St Luke's were using the envelope system, today it is down to 18 members. THE THINGS CHILDREN SAY.... AND DO

Working in a primary school where children are not so self-conscious as in later years has thrown up quite a few funny incidents. I mentioned a couple some time back and a few others spring to mind now which I will relate to you.

I was working in a Year 3 class (7 and 8 year olds) and one young lad just could not sit still. He would shout out answers when told not to, let his mind wander and gaze into space and, when supposedly sitting quietly 'on the carpet' to listen to the teacher, would fidget and move around. After an incident related below he didn't do it quite so much as before. This was because he always sat, usually knelt if the truth be known, on the floor with his hands in his pockets (despite often being told to take them out). One afternoon he was doing his usual swaying and fidgeting when he overbalanced, couldn't put his hands out in time to save himself and received a large carpet burn on his forehead when it reached the floor. Lesson learnt!

There was a child in Year 4 who was always whinging and 'telling' on the other children. Despite the fact that she usually instigated the problem in the first place it was always the other child's fault. If we didn't take her word for it she would burst into tears and continually moan. I solved this problem quite brutally actually. I got a large plastic mirror and showed her what her face looked like when she was crying. I defy any child not to laugh when they see the faces they pull when blubbing. I only had to do this a few times and things became calmer (she still moaned, but stopped her crying).

This was related to me by the teacher concerned as I was not in the class. The lesson was proceeding quietly enough when a usually very meek and mild child suddenly shouted out 'Jesus is coming down'! The teacher and TA with him were quite alarmed by this and looked wildly around for their visitor. It was only when the boy pointed to a picture high up on the wall drawn by another pupil that they were able to relax. The blu-tac had come unstuck on the top part of the picture of Jesus!

When children come up from the infants into Balfour Junior's Year 3 we give them a little lee-way at first to see who tries to 'swing the lead'. One way children do this is to continually ask to go to the loo. Once we realise they are bluffing we curtail the amount of times they go, pointing out they have break and lunch time to attend to the needs of nature. One young lady was in this category and I had been instructed by the teacher to say no. So I did, until one afternoon after a refusal on my part she said 'If you don't let me go I shall wet myself on purpose'. Stupidly I decided to call her bluff.....I will leave it to your to imagine as to what happened next!

I like working with children. They're weird! Tim.

- Thanks were recorded to Brian Davies and Roger Barton for their help and advice during this time of planning and letters will be sent.

There was a big clear out of the storeroom a few weeks ago. We have lost Tai Kwando as a letting and now they have taken all their equipment it has freed up space. Finance - the accounts for the year ending August 2015 have been audited and they were agreed by the meeting.

Appointments:

- Dorothy and Ian have been reviewed as Worship Leaders by The Local Preachers Meeting and the Church Council approved their continuation in this post.
- John and Fran's appointment as the representatives who take out Extended Communion to those who

are unable to attend church was ratified by the meeting.

• We are still seeking someone to take on the post of Christian Aid secretary.

Fund Raising:

- The recent Quiz evening raised £195 in total.
- The planned Panto has been cancelled because of lack of support.
- A concert given by Brian Davies and friends will now take place in the Autumn.
- There is a Beetle Drive & Silent Auction on February 27th.
- Junior Church is continuing when the children are there and for three Sundays out of four. The leaders and helpers will be commissioned at a service on 17th April.
- Pastoral the next meeting of the committee is on April 14th. The Commissioning Service on February 14th was an encouragement and reminder for us and the whole church of this unique characteristic of Methodism.



December 7th:

Dad is better although it is now confirmed that he has prostate cancer, which is very common in old men. In Malawi there are some herbs, which are believed to give some relief and he is already on them. Surely, I need guidance as sometimes I get confused when I think about life and what I am going through. I try to figure why and when shall I make a breakthrough. God knows why I am here and why I am experiencing all this. I am stuck but still hopeful. He is in control.

May the good Lord keep blessing you always.

December 14th:

Christmas is approaching. May you have successful preparations for this festival period. I wish you a healthy life. God will see us through in this world of so many questions but with little answers. Malawians are busy dividing themselves because of selfish leadership. I foresee another Zimbabwe as the land issue has surfaced with Malawian stakeholders making unreasonable claims. End times. May you be blessed always.

December 18^{th;}

It's busy this time around in the Christian community as people are preparing for Christmas. We are having daily sessions from Sunday when we shall reflect on the birth of Christ -who He is, why He came and what He expects of us i.e. To have fellowship with God.

There is very good improvement in Dad's health. The world gave us no hope saying he is too old for good health but God has proved otherwise. Truly nothing is impossible with God. Thanks for your prayers. Thank you for the gift, which will go a long way considering the economic hardships in the country. May God richly bless you all.

Let me once again wish you all well and may His presence be in all your undertaking.

Thank you for the gift, which I have cashed. I am actually thinking of what to buy Dad for Christmas. I would like him to see you in the gift to appreciate the spiritual brotherhood in Christ despite the distance. Thank you very much and may God richly bless you.

January 13th 2016:

What a start to the New Year. Malawi is being punished for legalizing homosexuality. We have no rains hence looming hunger. Deaths have already been registered. Some parts of the country on the other hand have had a heavy, disastrous downpour. So many houses felled, killing people in the process.

I have doubts about returning to Mozambique. Fighting is worsening and my brother has come back sensing disaster.

February 4th:

There had been an outcry by all Malawians because of the looming hunger. For a long time there had not been a drop of rain even though it is the rainy season. The rain has now come and we are very thankful, even more so for the prayers. God is faithful.

February 9th:

Dad is well, at least he is eating although more worryingly he is refusing to take medicine or drink water. I am considering taking him to my house because he cannot bath or dress himself. I believe now I am the right person to take care of him and not my sisters. There seems to be a dim light for a job in the government. I am just praying that it materialises. I am also expecting to hear from the School of Health Sciences.

Am wishing you all good health and God's blessing.

We are fine.

Unexpectedly the rains just stopped before



the maturity of Malawi's staple crop maize. I have sent you some pictures of the withering crop. Very disastrous pictures. Very proud of Mzati who suddenly is doing very well in mathematics. At least he compensate the looming hunger threat. Not afraid anyway because God fed Elija in a



drought stricken land, he also fed Israelites in the desert. Dad's health condition is good but looking after him in my house still remains my prime desire. My regards to all St Lukes congregants. We are all well. **Joseph**
